St. George's University is dedicated to ensuring the best students have access to the best medical education. We've developed a range of scholarships for qualified students to help make their dreams a reality. Here are two scholarships available to students with a bachelors degree from a US or Canadian school.

- **Chancellor's Circle of the Legacy of Excellence Scholarship** automatically awards \$80,100 to students with a minimum overall undergraduate GPA of 3.7, a 3.5 science GPA, and a 29 (old)/506 (new) MCAT score. This award is given to the first 50 in each class to be accepted and is distributed over four years.
- **The Legacy of Excellence Scholarship** awards up to \$60,000 to students demonstrating academic excellence in their undergraduate education.

KEITH B. TAYLOR GLOBAL SCHOLARS PROGRAM*






Excellent Performance on USMLE Board Exams

SGU US and Canadian students achieved a 97 percent first time pass rate on the USMLE Step 1 in 2015, marking the sixth consecutive year that SGU's US and Canadian students have surpassed students from US and Canadian schools.

All SGU students who took the USMLE 1 for the first time in 2015 achieved a 96 percent pass rate. The nearly 1,100 SGU students taking the exam for the first time hailed from 45 countries over six continents. They posted an impressive mean score of 224, with a mean score of 228 for SGU's Canadian students.

Residency directors surveyed use United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) scores as a primary indicator for granting residency interviews more than any other single factor.†


USMLE Step 1
